

Sailing Instructions

1.0 Rules

- 1.1 The Regatta will be governed by the rules as defined in the Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS) 2013-2016.
 - Attention is drawn to Part II Regulation No.2 Yachting New Zealand (YNZ) Safety Regulations:
 - The Maritime Transport Act 1994 states that the master of the vessel is at all times responsible for the safety of the vessel, the safety of those on board, discipline on board and for complying with all maritime rules, regulations and bylaws.
- 1.2 The YNZ Safety Regulations Part II, Category 5 will apply. It is recommended that an inflatable life jacket complete with harness be available for all crew.
- 1.3 The International Rules for Prevention of Collision at Sea 1972 apply in all races between sunset and sunrise replacing the relevant parts of Part 2 of the RRS.
- 1.4 All boats shall carry an operational VHF radio.
- 1.5 Should there be any conflict between the Notice of Race (NOR) and these Sailing Instructions, the Sailing Instructions shall prevail. This amends Rule 63.7

2.0 Notices to Competitors

2.1 Notices to competitors will be posted on the official notice board located at Race Headquarters.

3.0 Changes to Sailing Instructions

Any change to the Sailing Instructions will be posted on the Official Notice Board before 0800 hours on the day it will take effect, except that any change to the schedule of races will be posted by 1800 hours on the day before it will take effect.

4.0 Schedule of Races

There will be TWO races for the entire fleet on Saturday. There will be a time limit of 2.0 hours for the first boat in each division to finish Race 2, with a maximum of 2.5 hours for the remainder of the division to finish. Entrants failing to finish within the time limit will be scored Did Not Finish. If there is no finisher within 2.0 hours of the start of the race for any division then that race will be abandoned.

Race 3 will start as soon as possible following completion of all boats participating in the preceding race and within the time limit as described above. On finishing all boats shall advise the Race Officer they are ready to start the second race, and be on standby VHF channel 77 for notice prior to the first preparatory signal.

6.0 Racing Areas

The races will be held within the Waitemata Harbour and Hauraki Gulf

7.0 The Courses

The descriptions in Attachment "B" show the courses.

8.0 Marks

The following will be deemed to be obstructions and shall be passed on the main channel side only.

- a. Rangitoto Beacon
- b. Iliomama Beacon
- c. Browns Island Beacon
- d. Beacon on Sewer Outlet (Orakei)
- e. Doris Rock Port Hand Beacon (approx 25m north of Bean Rock)
- f. Emu Rock South Cardinal Beacon
- g. Red Buoys on eastern side of Motuihe Channel
- h. Cable beacons east of Devonport Wharf
- i. Green Starboard Hand Beacon SW of Torpedo Bay Wharf
- The outer line of all moored vessels and moorings between Torpedo Bay wharf and Devonport Wharf
- The outer line of all moored vessels and moorings in or adjacent to all Small Craft mooring areas shown on Chart NZ 5322.

9.0 The Start

- 9.1 Races will be started using Rule 26 with divisions starting at 10 minute intervals. The start sequence will be explained in detail at the Race Briefing on Thursday night
- 9.2 The start line will be defined in Attachment "B".
- 9.3 Boats whose warning signal has not been made shall avoid the starting area. The start times will be defined in Attachment 'A'

10.0 The Finish

The finishing lines will be defined in Attachment "B".

- 11.0 Penalty System
- 11.1 RRS Rule 44.1 shall apply for all boats.
- 11.2 A boat that has taken a penalty or retired under rule 31 or rule 44.1 shall notify the Race Officer within the protest time limit.

12.0 Time Limits and Target Times

- 12.1 Boats failing to finish Races 1, 3 or 4 by 1700hrs on any race day will be scored Did Not Finish. This changes rules 35 and A4.1.
- 2.2 There will be a time limit of 2.0 hours for the first boat in each division to finish Race 2, with a maximum of 2.5 hours for the remainder of the division to finish. Entrants failing to finish within the time limit will be scored Did Not Finish. If there is no finisher within 2.0 hours of the start of the race for any division then that race will be abandoned.

Race 3 will start as soon as possible following completion of all boats participating in the preceding race and within the time limit as described above. On finishing all boats shall advise the Race Officer they are ready to start the second race, and be on standby VHF channel 77 for notice prior to the first preparatory signal.

13.0 Protests and Requests for Redress

- 13.1 Immediately after finishing a boat intending to protest shall, in addition to the requirements of rule 61.1(a), inform the race committee boat at the finishing line of her intention to protest and the identity of the boat(s) protested against. The protesting boat must receive an acknowledgement from the race committee. This changes rule 61.
- 13.2 Protest Forms will be available from the Race Committee at Race Headquarters. Protests shall be delivered to the Race Committee at Race Headquarters within the protest time limit.
- 13.3 For each division, the protest time limit is 90 minutes after the last boat has finished the last race of the day. The same protest time limit applies to all protests by the race committee and protest committee and to requests for redress. This changes rules 61.3 and 62.2.
- 13.4 Notices will be posted within 30 minutes of the protest time limit to inform competitors of hearings in which they are parties or named as witnesses. All hearings will be held at the Race Headquarters.
- 13.5 Notices of protests by the race committee or protest committee at Race Headquarters will be posted to inform boats under rule 61.1(b).
- 13.6 On the last day of the regatta a request for reopening a hearing shall be delivered:
 - (a) within the protest time limit if the party requesting reopening was informed of the decision on the previous day;
 - (b) no later than 30 minutes after the party reopening was informed of the decision on that day.

This changes rule 66.

13.7 Mediation will be available

14.0 Scoring

- 14.1 The Low Point system of Rules Appendix A and A9 shall apply
- 14.2 Two races will be required to be completed to constitute a series
- 14.3 Three of four races to count for Divisions 1 9

15.0 Safety Regulations

A boat that retires from a race shall notify the race committee as soon as possible by VHF channel 77 or mobiles: 021 818-448 or 021 053 1637.

Emergency & Distress Calls: VHF channel 16

Co-ordination of any Search and Rescue operation will in the first instance be handled through the Marine Rescue Centre, Auckland. Prompt vessel or medical assistance:

VHF channel 80 for inner harbour

VHF channel 82 for the outer gulf.

Mobile: *500

The Organising Authority reserves the right to make safety spot checks and any boat, which is found not to be complying will be disqualified.

16.0 Radio Communication

- 16.1 A boat shall neither make radio transmissions to another boat while racing nor receive radio communications from another boat while racing that is not available to all boats. This restriction also applies to mobile telephones.
- 16.2 The Race Committee will endeavour to notify competitors of the course number and ensuing start times on VHF channel 77.
- 16.3 All Radio Communication with the Committee Boat shall be on VHF Channel 77 except for Emergency or Distress Calls, which shall be on VHF channel 16.

17.0 Prizes

Prizes will be given as follows.

17.1 Trophies will be awarded in all divisions and classes (minimum of 5 entries).

Minimum of 4 entries: Winners on Line and 1st on Handicap. 4-6 entries: Winners on Line and 1st & 2nd on Handicap. 7+ entries: Winners on Line and 1st, 2nd & 3rd on Handicap. The number of entries as above will be determined on Friday 28 February 2014 i.e. late entries will not be included.

- 17.2 The winners of all cups and trophies shall retain the trophies in perpetuity with the exception of the Col Wild Trophy, the Alden Tray, the Peters & May Trophy and the American Flag.
- 17.3 Friday & Saturday: Spot prizes may be claimed by a crew member of the winning boat.

Sunday: The helmsperson or owner who signed the entry form MUST be present to collect spot prizes on Sunday night or they will be redrawn.

18.0 Disclaimer of Liability

All those taking part in Classic Yacht Association of New Zealand races or any other sailing or launch events controlled by the Classic Yacht Association of NZ, as between the Classic Yacht Association of NZ and each of those taking part, do so at their own risk and responsibility and the Classic Yacht Association of New Zealand has no liability for any damage, loss or penalty suffered by any boat, crew or any other person taking part in such races or events. The Classic Yacht Association is not responsible for the sea worthiness of a boat whose entry is accepted and/or the sufficiency and/or adequacy of its equipment or the competence of its skipper or crew. The Classic Yacht Association reserves the right in its sole and uncontrolled discretion to refuse any entry.

Chad Thompson recounts ...

10 YEARS OF CYA ACTION!

Who would have thought back in the early 1990s that the Classic Yacht Association of New Zealand would be the organisation it is today? Back then, the 'old clunkers' were changing hands for very little money. The friends of the wannabe owners looked at them as if they had lost their marbles and were busily counselling them to enjoy recreational sailing on some other vessel, any vessel other than a tired old yacht.

Fortunately, the passion for these old boats was overwhelming. The restorations of Ariki in the late 1970s and of Tawera in the late 1980's had been very singular events. The new blood of Hamish Ross, who had bought Little Jim in 1994, Greg Scopas, the new owner of Ngataringa, and John Gorter, the owner of the little C-Class Thelma since 1987, was mixed with that of the writer, Chad Thompson, who had enjoyed a lifetime of sailing on Prize.

The group was spurred on by Ron Copeland, the then Commodore of the Ponsonby Cruising Club and owner of Nomad, a beautifully restored 26' mullet boat.

The classics had dropped off the racing scene after the change in rules governing the size of spinnakers in the mid 1970s, and the older owners of the pre WWII keelers were getting to the stage in life where racing was just a bit too hard. There were also these modern light displacement keelers making the racing a little one-sided.

only a programme of racing could be put together that the classics could participate in without being knocked around by the modern yachts. Old heavy displacement yachts with long keels and, in some cases, no winches, do not race around the harbour in the same way as the newer fin-keeled confections.

The first meeting of these like-minded skippers was in the workshop of the NZ National Maritime Museum where they, along with a number of Greg Scopas' friends. had gathered to review the work in progress on the restoration of Ngataringa in January 1995. The remainder of that season saw more of the classics get together in everincreasing numbers. Word was spreading amongst the owners of old yachts and, after a late season meeting in the saloon of Prize, a meeting was called for 8th May 1995 at the Ponsonby Cruising Club.

Twenty-three owners of old yachts gathered that night and within a very short time there were 50 expressions of interest in participating in an association.

By October 1995, an event programme had been established for the 1995/96 season and the number of members was growing weekly. Initially, most of the active yachts were the racing keelers, although an increasing number of cruising yachts were showing interest in participating. It was also great to see the number of early owners and their crews



taking up subscriptions in the association in order to keep abreast of news of their old rivals and the progress of the ever-increasing number of restorations.

Racing in the following seasons saw all of the above out on the water along with Moana, Rawene, Tamatea, Iorangi, Rawhiti, Teal, Victory, Lexia, Yum Yum, Spray II, Scout, Undine, Matia, Aorere, Irene, Reverie, Katrina, Ranger, Hinemoa, Waione, Francis, Aronui, Ta'aroa, Tucana, Dolphin, Jonquil, Gleam, St George and Alia. The list goes on.

By 1996, the profile of the Classic Yacht Association of New Zealand was way out of proportion with the number of yachts it represented. The committee was now looking to create financial security and independence for the association. Sponsorship was essential for the growth of the association and a very natural fit was identified with Logan Clothing. With the assistance of Mark Bartlett, who had been co-

opted onto the committee, Logan Clothing (marketed by Specialty Brands Ltd) became the association's sponsor for the next five years. Their very generous sponsorship included \$10,000 cash for administration and \$10,000 worth of prizes for each season's race programme. At the same time, the Ponsonby Cruising Club, which had generously provided the Association a home, became the official host of the Classic Yacht Association.

With the added incentive of generous prizes and an everincreasing number of classic yachts changing hands, the association flourished with regular publication of a magazine brought together by Sandra Gorter, monthly social gatherings at the PCC and an event programme built around the traditional feature races of each of the major yacht clubs around the Auckland Harbour.

The fifth anniversary of the Association was focused around the first defence of the America's Cup in February 2000. The Logan Classic (12th – 14th February 2000) was a huge success with more than 70 competitors.

The 1999/2000 Season was also the start of Joyce Talbot's enduring support of the affairs of the association. She joined in as the regatta secretary for the Logan Classic Yacht Regatta and has been the secretary of the Association ever since. With her ever-increasing activity the membership has grown to over 200 members in this our 10th Anniversary year.

Sponsorship by Logan Clothing was not renewed in 2000 and the Association was left with the reality of running a very busy events programme coupled with the increasing demands revolving around keeping in touch with the membership. substantial costs of the magazine were also overwhelming and conventional sponsorship dollars were no longer available after the America's Cup had consumed almost every dollar available. While the Ponsonby Cruising Club had been a very generous host, it was time for the association to move on.

The Royal New Zealand Yacht Squadron had been the traditional home of the old keelers up until the mid 1970s. The club's offer of financial support for the journal, coupled with there no longer being a clash of sponsorship between the Squadron's major sponsor, Line 7 and Logan Clothing made the move to the RNZYS a natural return

After the success of the International Classic Yacht Regatta in 2000, there was a lot of support for an ongoing event of a similar size. The Squadron, as the association's new host, enabled the planning of such a regatta based at RNZYS's Kawau Island facility to commence. The setting was idyllic and it was a great disappointment to all competitors when the race management was not up to scratch.

Nevertheless the event was the first of what has now become the major annual event of the association. The 2004 regatta was held at Motuihe Island in the Hauraki Gulf. Without the support of the weather gods, the regatta was blown away, not once but twice, when a second cyclone passed over Auckland during the second attempt to stage the regatta. The 2005 Classic Yacht Regatta earlier this year, based in downtown Auckland's Viaduct harbour, was the success everyone had been wanting and the scene is now set for this regatta to be staged from this location for the foreseeable future.

Until 2003, most of the original founders had overseen the affairs of the association. Times were

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changing and so too were the interests and needs of members. It was well recognised that it was necessary to expand the events programme to entice the launch owners who were following the racing yachts to many of the Hauraki Gulf destinations. This enthusiastic group were keen to be more involved, if only we could accommodate their particular needs and interests. The 2003 Regatta at Kawau was the first time the launches were involved by providing important support for the smaller yachts racing the long passage races to and from Kawau Island. It was also the first time they enjoyed their own log rally.

To grow the association from being a group of racing keel boat owners to a more all inclusive association offering owners, crew and classic 'boat' enthusiasts a more appealing event programme and giving

it the wherewithal to pursue its other goals, the committee could no longer be run by the founders. New blood in the form of Russell Brooke, chairman, supported by an almost entirely new committee, set about taking the association to a new level. Not only were all of the old values maintained, but the differing interests of launch owners were satisfied; and greater appeal was offered to cruising yacht owners. Through the efforts of some of the committee, the classics that were under threat of trashing are now being saved on an ever-increasing basis. Those classics that are affoat have also been protected from their possible loss to wouldbe owners off shore.

The membership of 200 now also consists of 54 launch owners. Up to 40 members attend the monthly meetings and the three day 2005 Classic Yacht Regatta enjoyed more than 50 entrants. The interest in classic yachting in New Zealand is ever-increasing and what the association has to offer its members is broadening all the time.

The passing of the anniversary of the inaugural meeting of the 8th May 1995 almost went unnoticed as the committee and members of the association were all too busy enjoying yet another season of Corinthian yachting. Long may they, the owners and crews, continue to do so. With air in their lungs, fuel in the engines of the launches, and wind in the sails of gracious yachts, may they all continue to beautify our fabulous harbours and cruising grounds































